LEARNING WITHOUT LIMITS

At 46, Rosemary continues to challenge expectations and prove that a disability does not define what a person can accomplish. Born with cerebral palsy in Hong Kong, Rosemary moved to California at age 12. From a young age, she was determined to learn and show others what she was capable of.

Rosemary underwent several surgeries to improve her mobility, and today she can stand and walk. She also taught herself six languages: English, Cantonese, Spanish, Japanese, Shanghaiese, and Filipino, using television, books, and, later, computers.

Today, Rosemary's love of learning continues at The Fairmount Resource Center. One of her favorite parts of the program is taking college classes through North Orange Continuing Education. She hopes to one day attend classes in person and dreams of becoming a special education supervisor.

The Arc has also helped Rosemary learn to type, build friendships, participate in physical therapy, and develop greater independence.

Outside of The Arc, Rosemary enjoys spending time with her "second family," going to the park with her dog, Happy, reading and socializing. She loves *Chicken Soup for the Soul* because other people's stories inspire her to keep growing.

Perhaps her greatest accomplishment, she says, has been finding her voice. Rosemary says she once kept everything to herself. Today, she shares her story, journals every day, and talks to anyone she can about what she has overcome.

Rosemary continues to learn, dream, and inspire others to see possibility beyond disability.

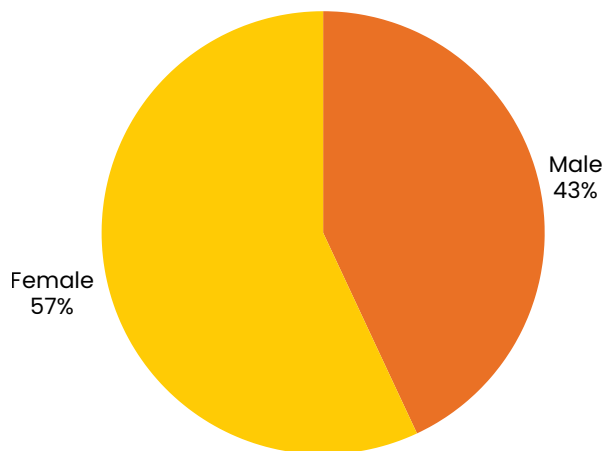

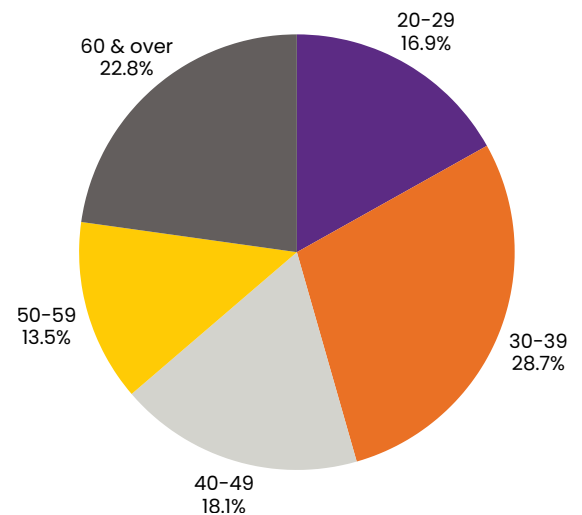

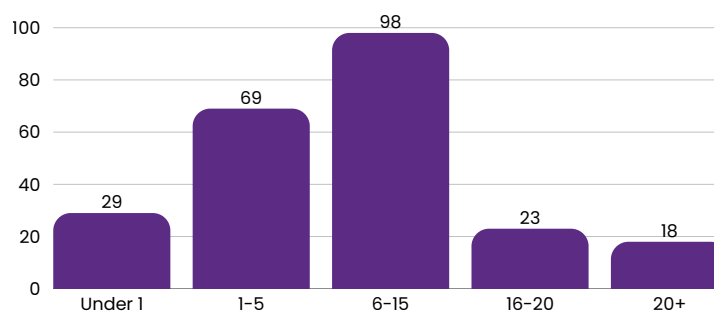

PARTNERSHIP HIGHLIGHTS

Thanks to a \$500,000, two-year grant from the Department of Aging, we were able to invest in both our staff and the people we support. The funding provided Relias training for our Direct Support Professionals, new laptops and computers to improve participant engagement and case management, recruitment tools to expand our workforce, building improvements, and a freestanding overhead Hoyer lift track system at one of our medical day programs.

We are also grateful to Eta Phi Beta Sorority, Inc., Gamma Omega Chapter, the Master Food Preservers, and Riverside Master Gardeners for partnering with us to create fun, hands-on experiences for our participants. From making jam to planting flowers, these classes provided an enriching learning experience for all.

Rich dedicated his career in service of individuals with IDD, ensuring they received the same rights and entitlements in the community as every citizen.
